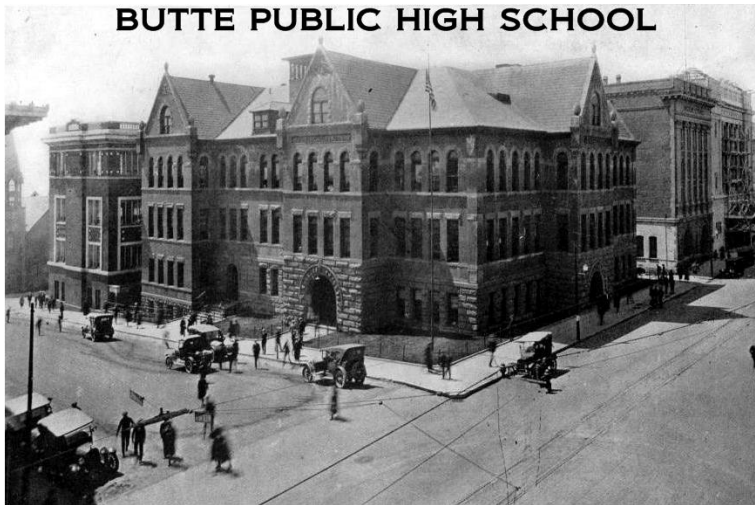



The High School Eleven of 1893

(Kenneth Simmons)

Football really became a thing of importance in Montana in 1893, and especially in Butte, which then was a small, booming, mining camp. First the men took it up; then the high school boys followed their example and learned the game and organized a football team.

Mr. Riley, the principal of the high school, saw what great enthusiasm the boys were showing over the game and he called them together one day and spoke of organizing a high school football team, the first that had ever been attempted. He told them what difficulties would arise, what rules they would have to learn, how they should have to practice and pay attention to the rules. They earnestly started practicing and although they did not possess any gymnasium equipment whatever, they made a great deal of progress, before the season had practically begun they had already organized a team and were in shape to play games with other teams.

The high school team practiced quite a lot with the old Butte professional team, which was organized at that time. This team, composed of some of the best football men of the country, and managed by George Chase, an enthusiastic football lover, defeated all of the teams organized here; mostly professional teams for there were hardly any amateur teams then. After winning the city and then the state championship they played several games in the coast cities and were not defeated once and by doing this they were proclaimed the champions of the West. Many rich men had become the ardent supporters of the team and they arranged for a series of games to be played, and these were to decide the championship of the East up to Pittsburg. The team was not defeated in any of these games and returned to Butte at the close of the season as the champions of the Pacific coast, of all of the important western towns and east up to Pittsburg and they had not lost a single game during their wonderful campaign.

The Butte High school team had the distinctive honor of being the first high school team in Montana, as well as the first high school football champions of the state.

Anaconda and Helena organized teams shortly after the Butte team started. There were quite a few teams organized in the different cities, but only a few of these were high school teams. They generally consisted of boys between sixteen and nineteen. The strongest of these teams were the Silver Bow juniors, the Deer Lodge juniors and the Big Butte team, composed chiefly of miners.

The first game that the high school team ever played was with Helena. They went to that city early in the season and returned victorious. Then they went to Anaconda, Deer Lodge and Silver Bow, and defeated all of the teams of these places. At Deer Lodge they played at a picnic and defeated the Deer Lodge juniors, win-

ning fifty dollars. At that time there was hardly any distinction between amateur and professional teams. Money was wagered freely and the Butte team always had its stream of backers; one of the best being Al. Green, now a prominent citizen of this city.

The Butte team had played the Silver Bow juniors several times and had succeeded in winning every time. The last game the team played in Butte was one of their hardest and was with the Silver Bow juniors. The Silver Bow juniors had materially strengthened their team with some of the best athletes in the city. They had a decided advantage over their opponents in the first part of the game, but the high school team retaliated in the second half and tied their opponents. They were on the point of winning when the referee, who favored Silver Bow, called time and the umpire claimed that there still was five minutes to play. Then a general scramble followed and during this someone ran off with the ball and the game ended. This ended the football season, and the first Butte High school football team, nobly emulating the example of their older friends, were declared the junior champions of the state.

The style of playing then was the crudest. The heavy mass plays were in use, including the flying wedge and Indian shift. No science to speak of was used. The heavy man was always preferable to the light man and consequently the game generally was a contest between strength and muscle, rather than brains.

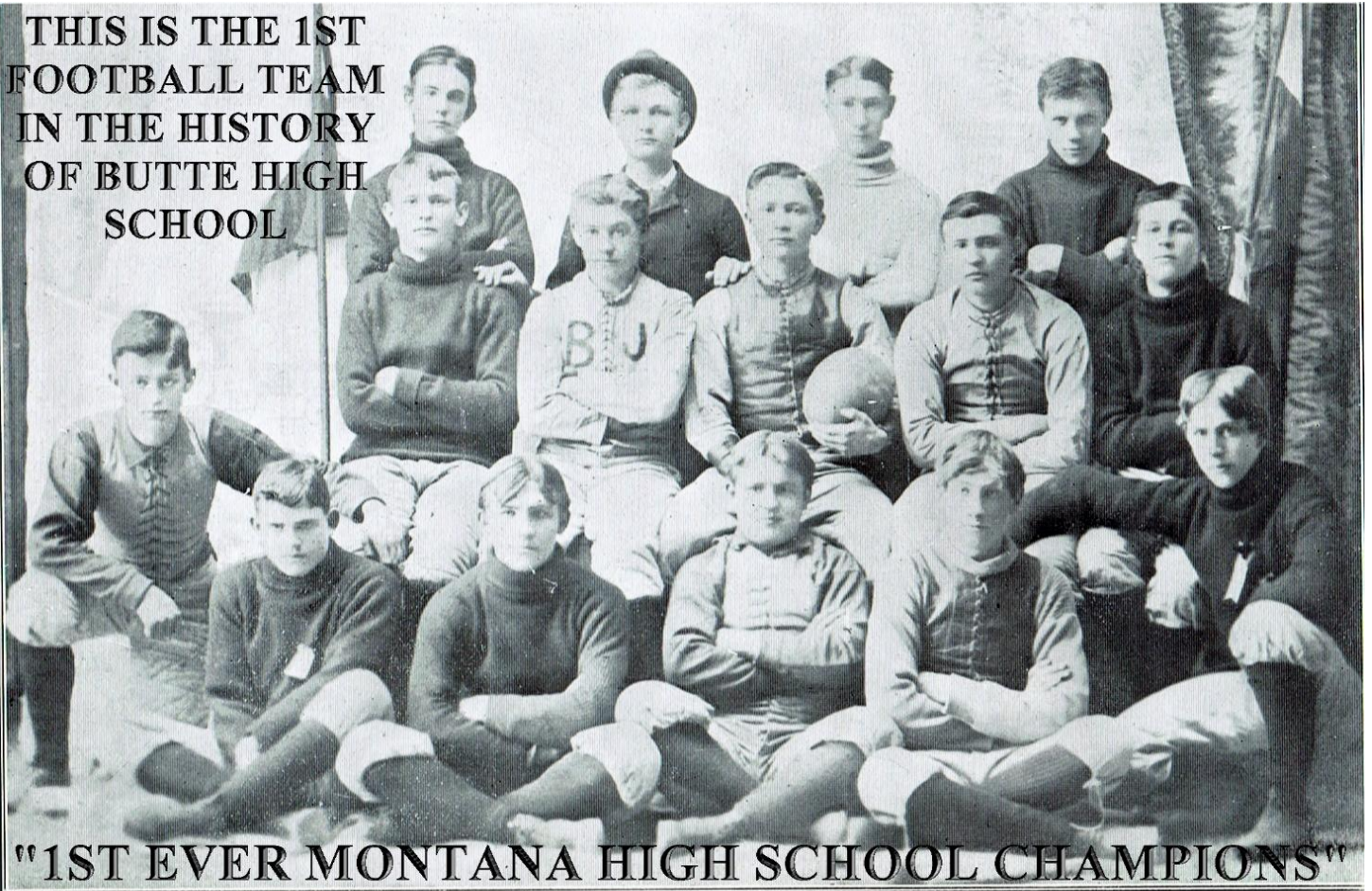
Harold Bretherton was captain and right half. He is now American consul at Aguascalientes, Mexico. George Scott, now holding an important position with the Amalgamated company; David Hopkins, full back, mining in Arizona; J. Charles Sullivan, quarter back, a prominent attorney; Wallace Bretherton, manager of the laboratory of the South Porcupine Mining company of South Porcupine, Ontario, Canada; Jack Wolfe, left guard, in the insurance business with the Goodwin Investment company; Finley McRae, right tackle, Russel Matlock, left tackle, owner of the Lincoln block on Park street; George Curtis, center, a capitalist; James E. Higgins, right end and right half; Elmer Pfouts, left end, a mining man; Fay Curtis, full back, ranching in the Jefferson valley, and Ray Calkins and Dave Bevan, who played behind the line. Ralph Richards, whose father has been the clerk in the high school for the past sixteen years, played full back in some of the games. Other prominent players were Urban McLean, Vincent McLean, Sid Bretherton, Patrick Lynch, at present in Seattle, George Heimbach and Edward Bennett.

Mr. Charles Sullivan, one of the members of the first high school team, was recently at the high school and through Mr. Millikin, made an offer to the high school to have the picture of the first football team framed (a reproduction of which is produced here), and hang it in a prominent position in the high school building. We may feel very grateful for this present, for it will be a very great honor to have the picture of not only the first Butte High school football team, but also the first high school state champions.

First Butte High Football Team

In 1893 a husky group of students, under leadership of Harry Bretherton, formed Butte High School's first football team. Grid players of that era had to be husky with plenty of stamina along with heft. For those were the days of power plays, and it was not unusual to see the entire team form a flying wedge ahead of the ball carrier with players of the offensive team grabbing hold of their runners anywhere they could and pulling, pushing or yanking the ball totter along in any direction which would make the ball advance.

The wonder is, Harry Bretherton said once during a visit to Butte, (he now resides in New Mexico,) "that some of the ball carriers were not dismembered."

The Butte team played its first high school game in 1894 against Helena, defeating the Capital City team, 8-4, and claimed the first Montana High School championship. Touchdowns in that era counted four points; therefore it is to be considered that Butte scored two touchdowns against Helena's one.

Bretherton coached and captained the team in '93 and was team captain in '94, when the eleven was coached by George Chase. Other coaches of Butte high grid clubs down through the years, have been:

Harry Dahlberg, present coach of the Purples took over in 1922, and won his first state championship in 1924.

Butte championship teams were recorded following 1910 as follows:

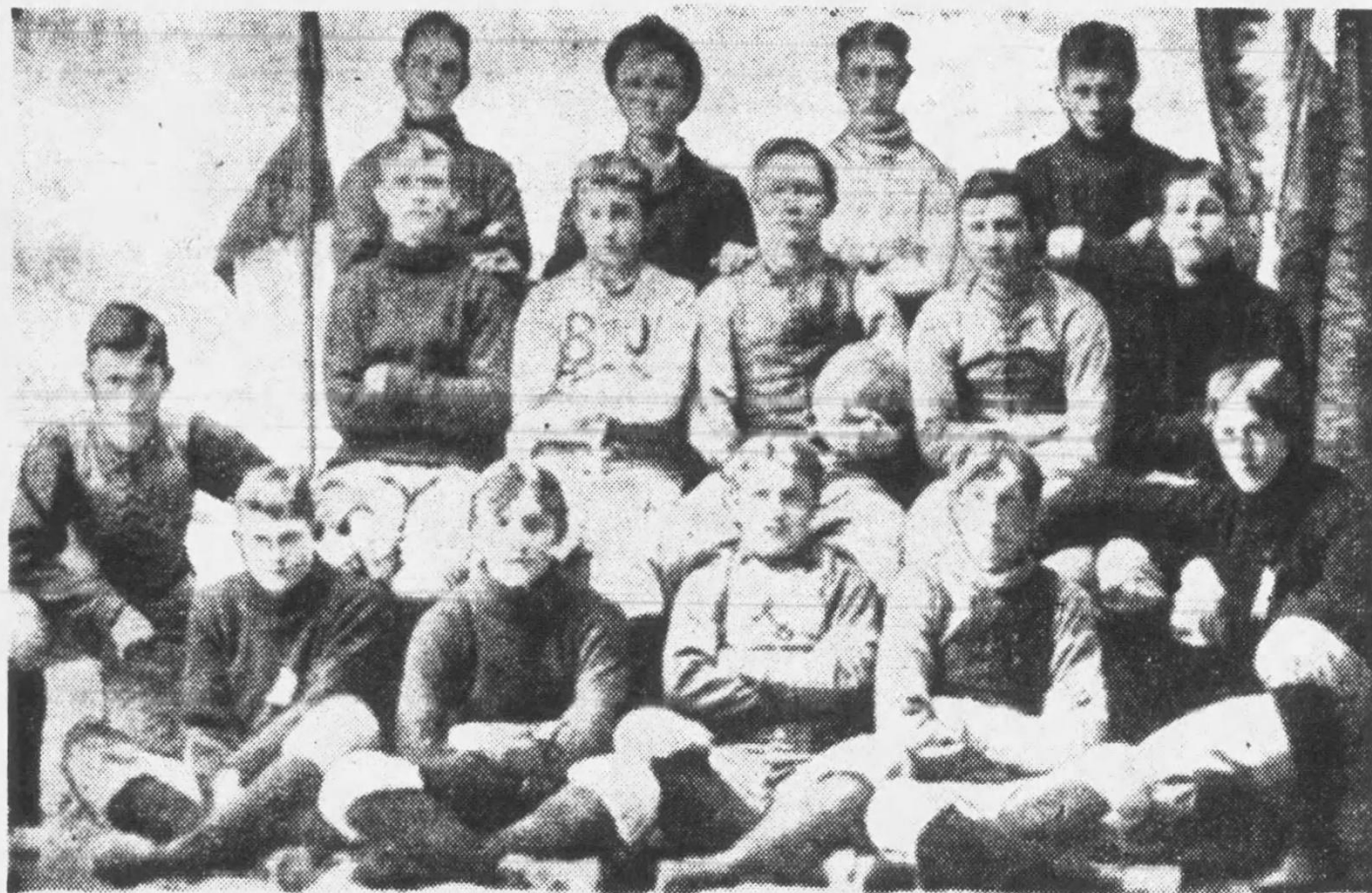

Coach Dahlberg, dean of Montana's high school athletic mentors, and a coach with one of the finest high school records of any interscholastic mentor in the nation, started the system of game, and cocaptains when he took over the coaching system at the high school, and many boys during his regime have served as captains of the Purples.

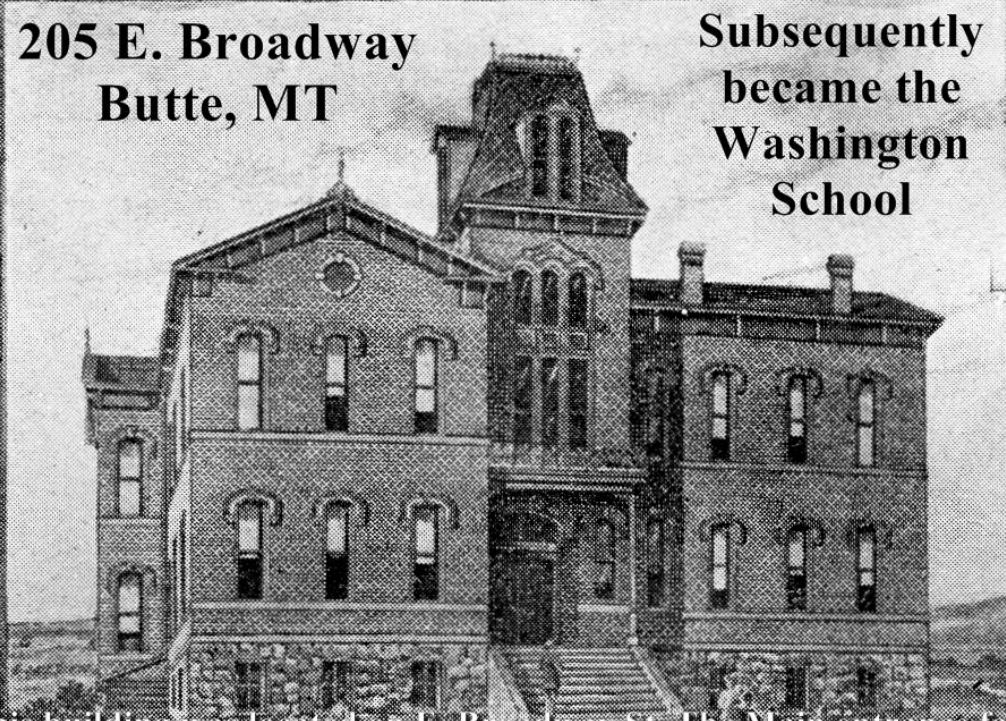

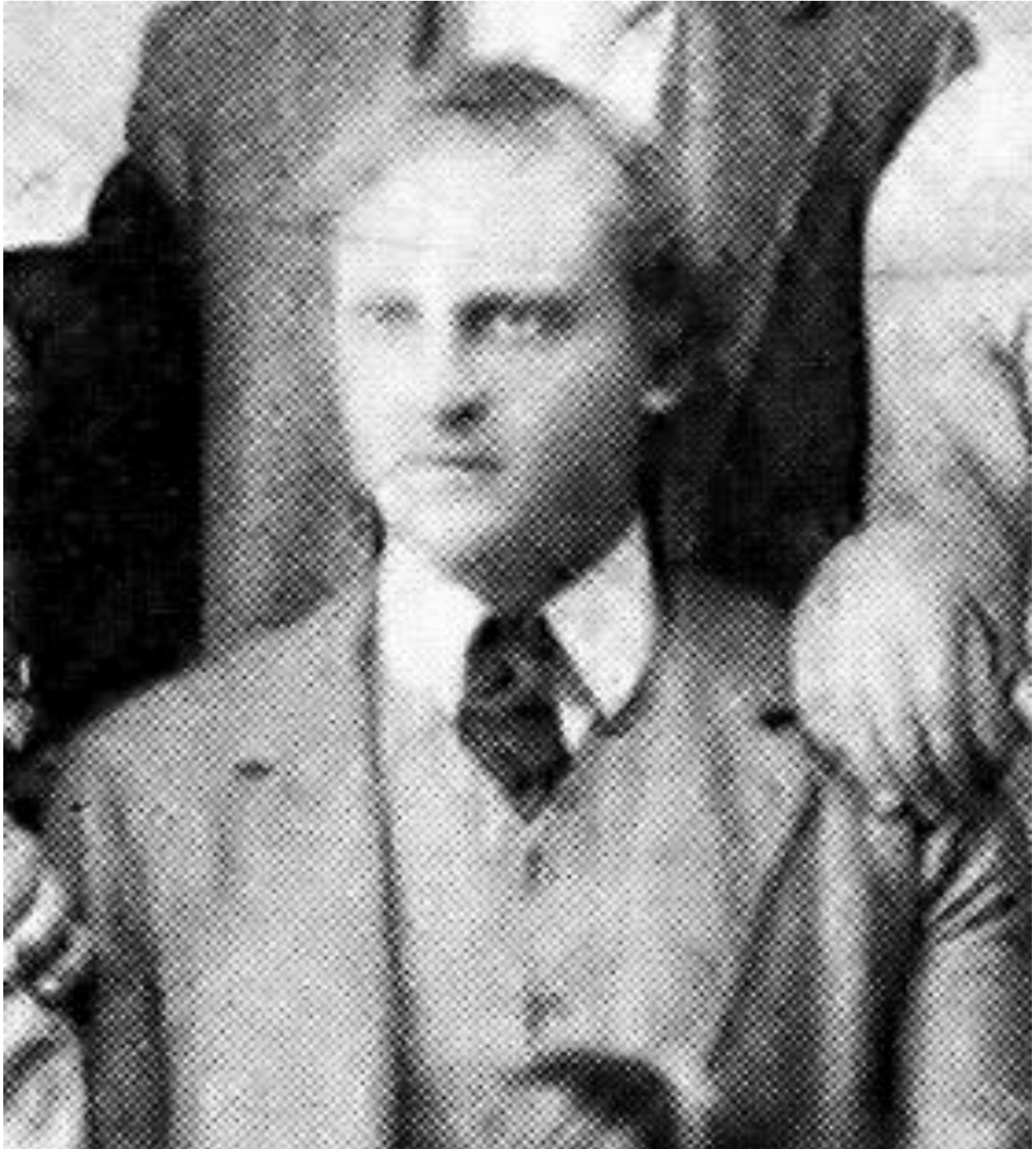

MONTANA SPORT TALES

OF OTHER DAYS

**Brethertons Had Six, Most
From One Family on Butte Hi
Football Teams of All Time.**

**Dawsons, Crowleys, Had Five;
Dahlberg, Kyle, Brown, Roach,
Families Produced Four Each.**

If all the ends on Butte high football teams were placed end to end the late Sid Bretherton, captain of the 1896 team, would stand out as the cream of the crop.

That's the opinion of Urban McLean, an end man himself, who played on the first Butte high eleven, organized in 1893. McLean sets himself up as an authority, for he has seen every game played by Butte high teams in this city in a 44-year period, either as a player or spectator. McLean wore a Butte high uniform on no less than ten teams, dating from 1893 to 1902.

The McLean opinion is shared by many old-timers. Some who played with Bretherton will recount tale after tale of Sid's skill, daring and leadership.

John Corette and Walter Roach, members of the '96 team, unhesitatingly bestow the palm to Bretherton as the outstanding wing man to wear a Butte uniform. They go so far as to pick Sid Bretherton as one of the greatest of all Montana high school football players.

NO "RINGERS" IN '96.

The 1896 team captained by Sid Bretherton was simon pure. There were no ringers on the squad. Recruiting off the streets wasn't resorted to until 1897. And the 1896 team was responsible for the practice—in an innocent way. More than half the squad graduated in the spring of 1897. The prospects for a good team in the fall weren't too rosy.

An ambitious schedule of games had been lined up. Most of the '96 players were invited to play on the '97 team—and most of them did. When the bars were let down, football players were recruited from the mines, the stores, etc. And that loose policy prevailed until the end of the 1902 season.

minutes, or so, it seems. George has had service and some champions at Miles City, Anaconda, Hoquiam, Puyallup and Chehalis, Wash., and at the present time is head basketball coach and football line coach at Montana University. Al is directing athletic teams at Puyallup, Wash. This year his squad won the championship of its district without suffering a defeat.

The Dahlbergs' record is unique. All four were regulars on Butte high teams, and moved into regular berths on teams at the University of Montana. All were stars. Harry played four years at both schools. He captained a team at Butte high and also was captain of the U team that defeated the University of Washington. Not many families can tie the Dahlberg football record. The foursome own a flock of letters not only for football but in other sports as well.

In the long ago, four Brown boys, brothers, wrote their names in the football records. They were Jud, Clyde, Earl and Harley.

The Kyles came through with a foursome, too. Bill, Walt, Bob and

ONLY 15 OUT '93.

There were only 15 boys on the first Butte high squad—1893. Capt.

The Brethertons win the "most" title, for no less than six athletes of that name pigskin-paraded in purple and white jerseys.

Harry Bretherton captained the first Butte team in 1893. Harry was halfback.

Wally Bretherton played tackle on the same club and was team manager.

Sid Bretherton captained the 1896 team and also played on the 1894-95 elevens. He was the first of four Brethertons to play an end position.

Herb Bretherton played on the 1900-01 teams at right end.

Charles Bretherton was on the 1899 and 1901 teams and covered a wing position and also played in the backfield.

"Rusty" of Second Generation.

The Bretherton athletic book was closed for a quarter of a century, then along came—

Bernard (Rusty) Bretherton who played on the 1928-29 grid teams. "Rusty" played end. He also won his letter on three basketball teams, captaining the hoopsters in 1930. In the days of his predecessor Brethertons, basketball was not listed in the high school sports curriculum.

The Brethertons, all related, were of three crops. Sid and Herb were brothers; Charles, Wally and Harry Bretherton are brothered too; Bernard is fathered by Herb.

Five Great Crowleys.

A Crowley family had five representatives on Butte high football, basketball and track teams. They were Clem, Cliff, Leo, Dan and Cale. Everyone of the Crowley quint was outstanding athletically. Fortunate was the coach who had one or more boys of that name on his squad. Clem, Cliff and Leo are brothers, Dan and Cale, brothers, are nephews of the threesome.

FOUR DAHLBERG BROTHERS.

Harry, George, Oscar and Al Dahlberg, brothers, made Butte high history in various sports. Not only were the Dahlbergs great athletes, but three of them have been successful in coaching. Harry has the greatest success record of any high school coach in Montana. Championships in football, track and basketball are won by Swede's teams every few

Jim were their identification handles. Brothers all.

A quartet of Roach brothers, Walt, Dick, Jim and Ed footballed while high-schooling.

The Dawsons numbered five. Percy, Ralph and Dlo, brothers, graduated 30 or more years ago. Roger and Dally, sons of Ralph, followed in the football steps of their father and uncles.

Bill, George and Frank Crowley was another brother group that gridded for the Purple and White.

The Brinton threesome, William, Charles and Owen, played for Butte around the turn of the century.

John, Jerry and Emmet Sullivan represent another football threesome to wear Butte colors.

Harry Bretherton and Jim Higgins were halfbacks, Dave Hopkins played at full, Charles Sullivan was at quarter, George Scott and Ralph Richards were the endmen, Jack Wulf and Lynch, tackles; Findlay McRae and Russ Matlock, guards and George Curtis, center. Reserves were Jim Heimback, Elmer Fouts, Fay Curtis and T. Bennetts.

Butte high teams of the '90's would play games in any season of the year. Even Sunday games were booked frequently.

The record of Urban McLean with 10 years of play on Butte high football teams is unparalleled. John Corette was a close second to McLean, with seven years of football competition at Butte high.

Buck Hall, coach of the school's 1896 team, was an ex-Princeton player. Hall was the first coach at the school who knew all the football answers. He was a stickler for condition, discipline and teamwork. The kids went for "Buck" in a big way.

BUTTE PROS HOT IN '96.

In 1896 the Big Butte professional team was running wild, cleaning up against the Reliance A. C. of Oakland, the Olympic club of San Francisco, the Multnomah club of Portland, the Denver A. C., the Omahas and Iowa State. The Butte high team furnished scrimmage practice for the Big Butte's once a week. Captain Jim Hooper of the big boys, rated by Bib Edgren as one of the greatest guards of his day (at Michigan U and Butte) found himself on the ground at one of the workouts. Urb McLean, midget high school end, tackled Hooper and Jim took a long count. When he got to his feet he remarked "These kids are too rough." Scrimmage relations with the Big Butte team terminated with that workout.

John Curtis has the distinction of being captain of three Butte high football teams. He was the head man on the 1900, 1901 and 1902 teams. A record.

In the early high school football days the players bought or borrowed

BALMY DAYS OF BUTTE FOOTBALL RECALLED BY FAMOUS TEAM OF '96

Butte high's Purple and White football squads have taken state and intermountain championships in the memory of the younger generation of football fans and every player from the days of Turk Oass and Duke Schroeder to the recent years can be recalled, but athletic glory has gone unknown with half a dozen prominent men of Butte today who were stars on the "team of '96," shown in the above photograph.

Strange, for the average group picture of 25 years ago, shows a goodly number of faces that have passed on from an athletic wild world, the one above has but one member who has gone to the Great Beyond, and he succumbed years later to injuries received while he captained the famous eleven of Butte high in '96. He was Sid Bretherton, the dashing leader for the almost forgotten aggregation that in the words of the sport chronicler of the high school in that day "had victories complete; their glory was well deserved and their reputation of being the champion school, as well as the champion junior team of the state, is well worthy of unlimited praise."

From professional man to farmer are the names of the old squad enumerated today. In Butte a representation at the high school games is always found in the old guard; to whom ideas of the forward pass and other open style work on the gridiron in their day would have once gone to brand the game as "easy."

Bretherton Dead.

Sid Bretherton, left end and field leader of the eleven, went into the mining business following his graduation from school. He lived in the

East for years before his death, which occurred in Ohio three years ago as a result of an operation upon his head, necessitated by a football injury incurred when he captained the team.

Earl "Click" Brown, guard, was a 15-year-old griddle at the time he appeared in the photograph. He left Butte 20 years ago and is now in California.

H. A. Holley, on the other guard job, is now in Helena in the government land office and visits his old classmates in Butte occasionally.

Percy Dawson, full back in the old days, is a brother of Ralph Dawson of Butte, and is a resident of California, where he has been since graduating from Leland Stanford university.

Henry Porter was left tackle on the team of 1896. He is a brother of George Porter, state auditor, and is now a farmer in the Bitter Root valley.

Clarence Hopkins, brother of Henry Hopkins, Butte attorney, and son of Mrs. Olivia Hopkins, one of the city's pioneers, was listed as substitute on the squad. He is now in California and is a successful mining engineer.

Attorney and Banker.

John Corette, one of Butte's leading attorneys and vice president of the Metals Bank and Trust company, was quarterback of the team and with 116 pounds of beef, he was a star of the outfit, the high school publication of that day, declares.

Bert Tonkin, now a surgeon in Wyoming, was a substitute and his stout stature was thrown into many of the games of the day.

James Glover, now in the milk business here, was another sub of the champion team.

Bert Farlin, a mining man in Butte

today, was left guard of the eleven and was a 175-pounder in his young days as a griddle.

Fred Ward of Jensen, Lloyd & Ward, wholesale dry goods, played at the right half back position. He was also a star says the chronicler of the day.

Another Butte man of today who wore moleskins for the team is James Spencer, advertising manager of the Butte Daily Post.

George Jackson, a stationary engineer at a Butte mine, was center on the squad and a good one in his day.

R. Kyle, brother of Will Kyle, and at present with the Butte & Superior Mining company, was the regular at the left half back job.

Brothers on Team.

Will Kyle, prominent Butte attorney, was a 110-pound, reserve backfield man in those days and vied with his brother for a regular position in 1896.

Ed Roach, assayer and member of the firm of Lewis & Walker, Wyoming street, was another substitute and later played on the regular team.

George Van Wart has been a farmer in Western Canada for a number of years but in '96 was a hustling end on the now almost forgotten squad.

John M. McKay, principal of the high school at the time, is a brother of Mrs. J. L. Carroll of Butte and left here some years ago to reside in Oakland, Cal.

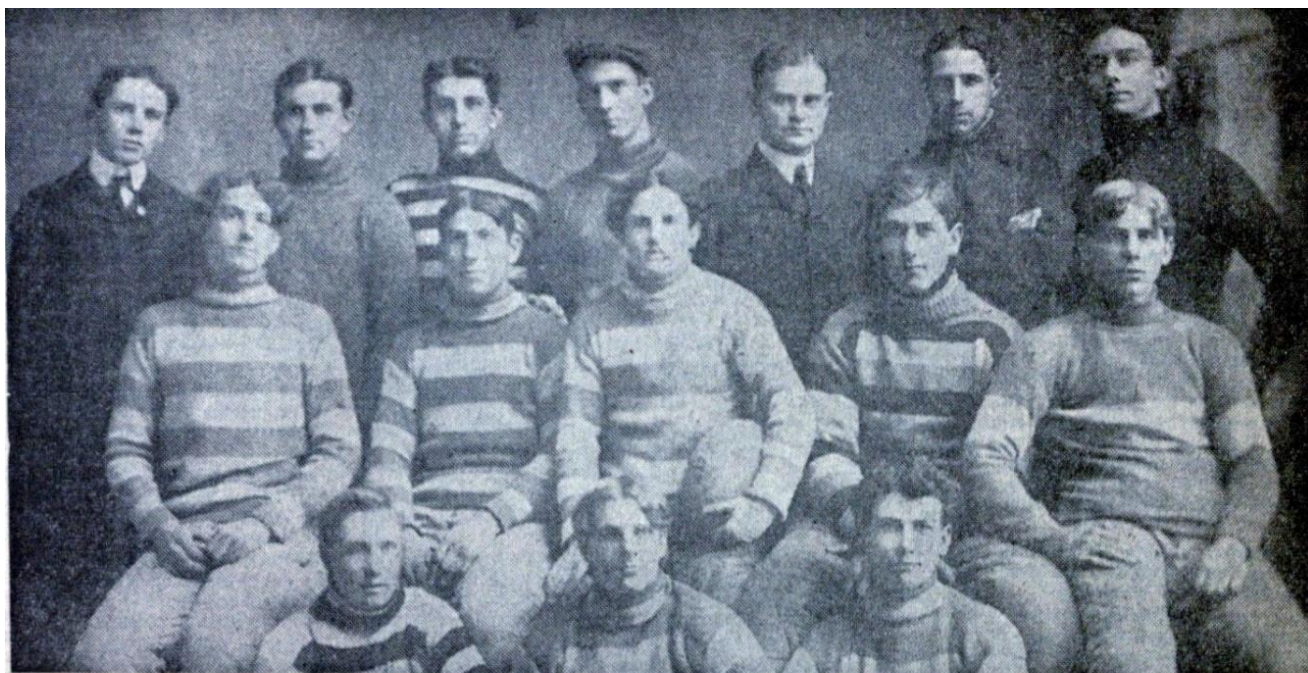

Butte High Team That Won Intermountain Gridiron Championship

Below is the picture of Butte high school's great football team which won the championship of Montana, Utah and Idaho in a game played on Thanksgiving day at Columbia Gardens, Nov. 26, 1914, when they defeated the Granite, Utah, high school team by the score of 39 to 10 before more than 3,000 wildly cheering holiday fans. The team rated not only as one of the greatest but probably the greatest that ever represented the Purple and White on the local gridiron, many old-time followers of the game contend.

The players shown in the picture were coached by George Downer, superintendent of schools and football strategist of Montana, and Dr. R. R. (Duke) Schroeder. The picture was taken on a vacant lot adjoining the old Butte high school

the day before the game. Reading, left to right, the players are:

Front row—Cliff Crowley, line, now a resident of California; E. R. (Mike) Blinn, line, now a resident of Butte; L. C. The Butte papers carried long stories of the game and the sports writers of that day, Harold Crary of the Anaconda Standard, N. C. (Spike) Haynes of the Butte Miner and Bill Floto of the Daily Post were agreed that the Purple and White played with a "dash and finish" never before seen by a Butte high school team and that there was no doubt of the outcome from the very first whistle, despite the fact that the Granite players were big, strong and fast. Butte's starting lineup included Clinch and Driscoll, ends; Dahlberg and Crowley,

tackles; Myers and Harris, guards; Dee, center; Rowe, captain, quarterback; Phelps, left half; Vogler, right half, and Freshman, fullback. Several others saw action before the game was over, including Molthen, Ambrose, Mueller, Blinn, and others.

Captain Rowe, who scored three touchdowns and kicked three goals, was one of the numerous stars of the game. Buddy Phelps, who scored two touchdowns in spectacular style, was another. The line plunging of Freshman, Dahlberg, Molthen and Vogler and the great offensive and defensive work of Dee, Driscoll, Harris, Myers and Clinch were added features. In fact, every player on the Butte team was a star, according to the stories of the game. "The Intermountain champions of 1914 showed yesterday that they were a superior team to the Montana champions of 1913 when a strong defensive Butte team and a strong kicker nosed out for state honors," one sports editor wrote.

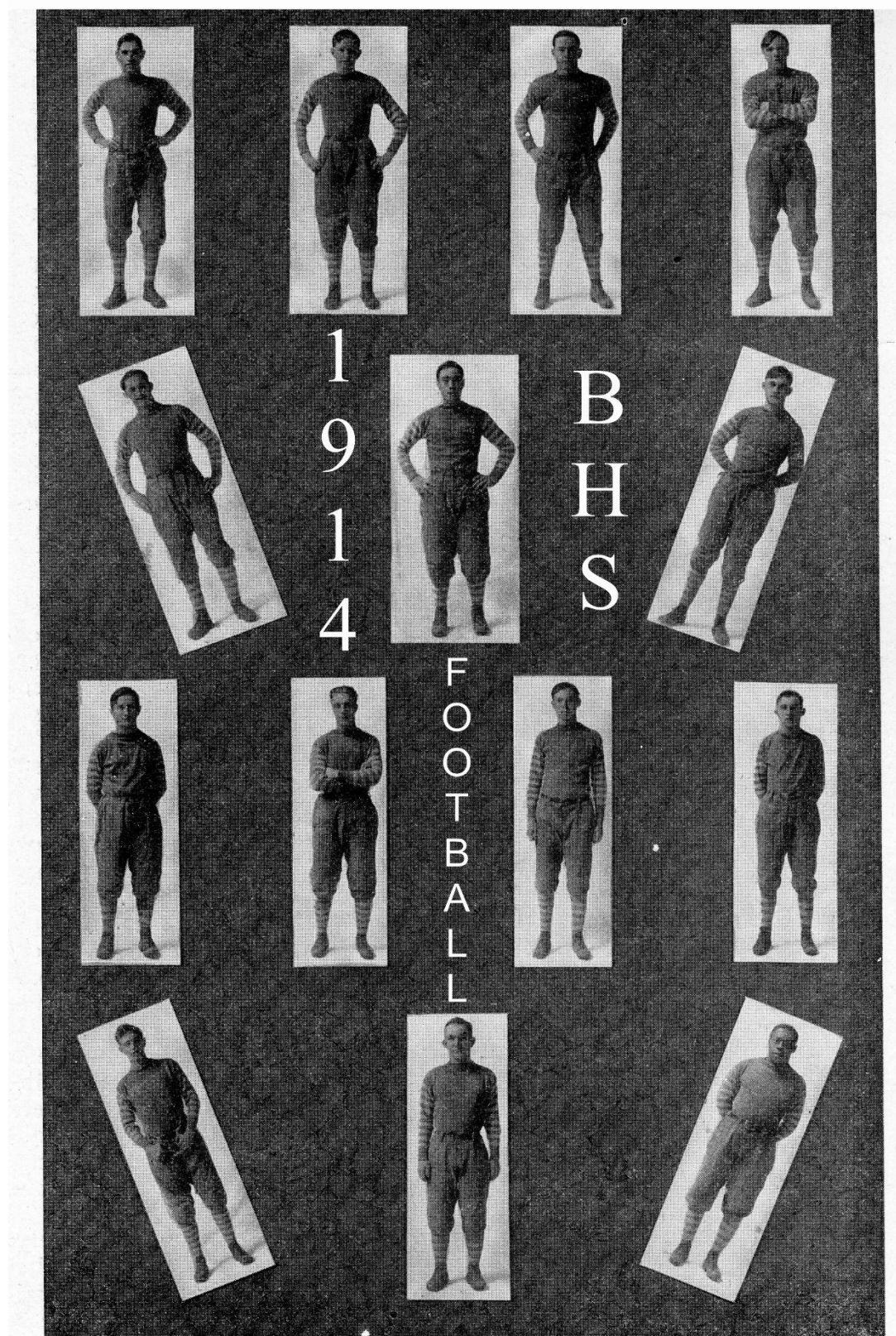
The Granite team came to Butte from Salt Lake City after having won the championship of Utah and Idaho. In the regular schedule of the Butte team such teams as Great Falls, Missoula, Anaconda, Billings and other top teams of the day were defeated.

Of the men who participated in that great game of more than a third of a century ago, "Swede" Dahlberg is the only one now actively connected with the game. For more than a quarter of a century he has been the coach of the Butte high school grid team, while Harris is the assistant principal at the school.

Peter Hale, a lineman on the team, later attended the United States Naval academy and has had a distinguished career with the Navy, rising to the rank of captain. He was an instructor at the academy and also commanded war ships. His parents operated the famous Hale house here.

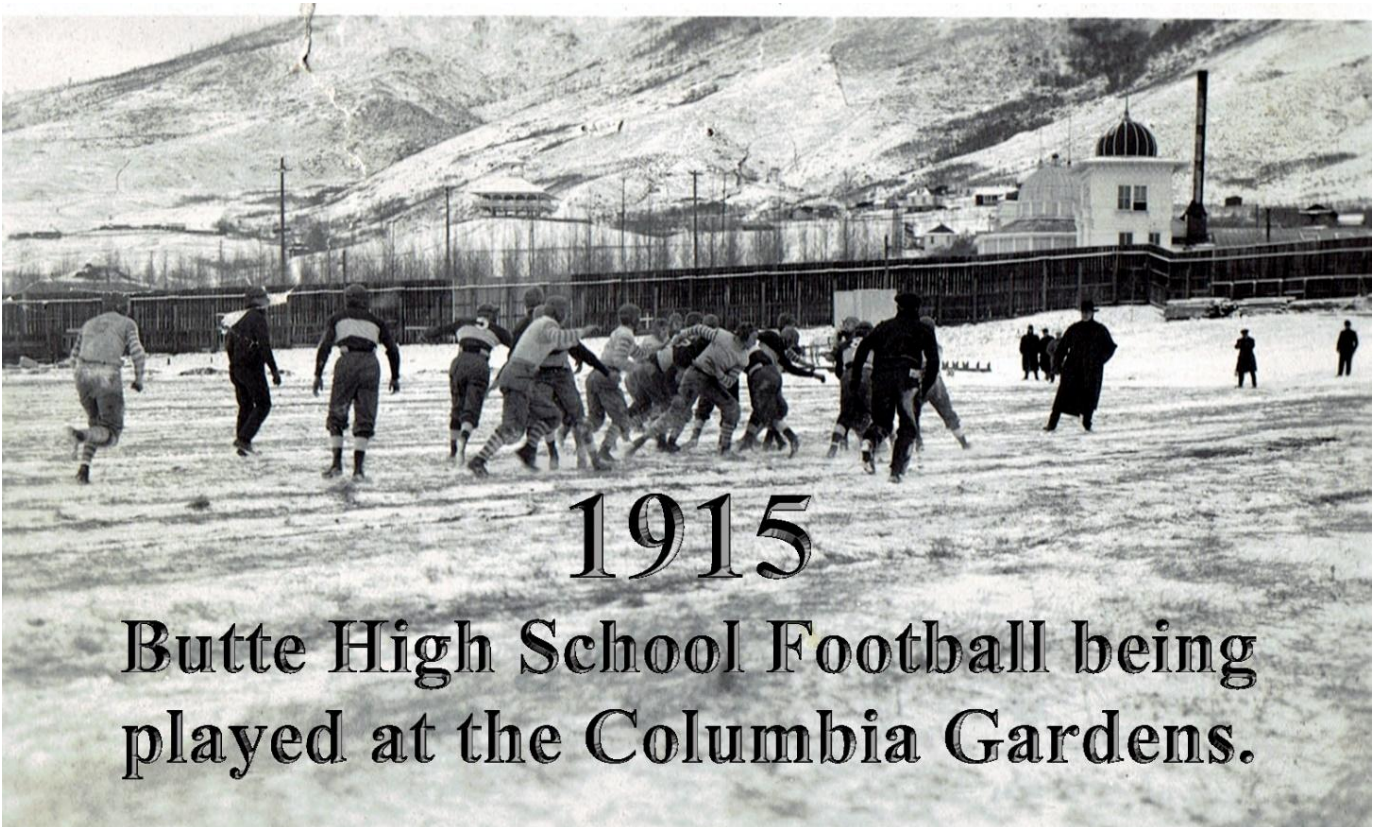

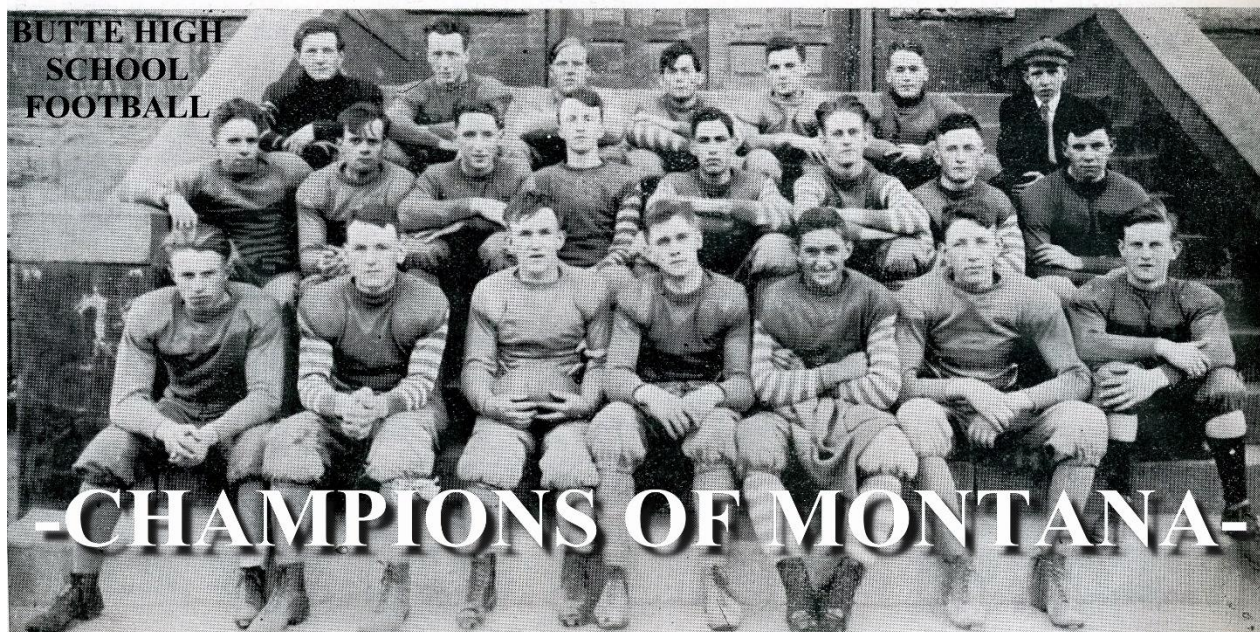

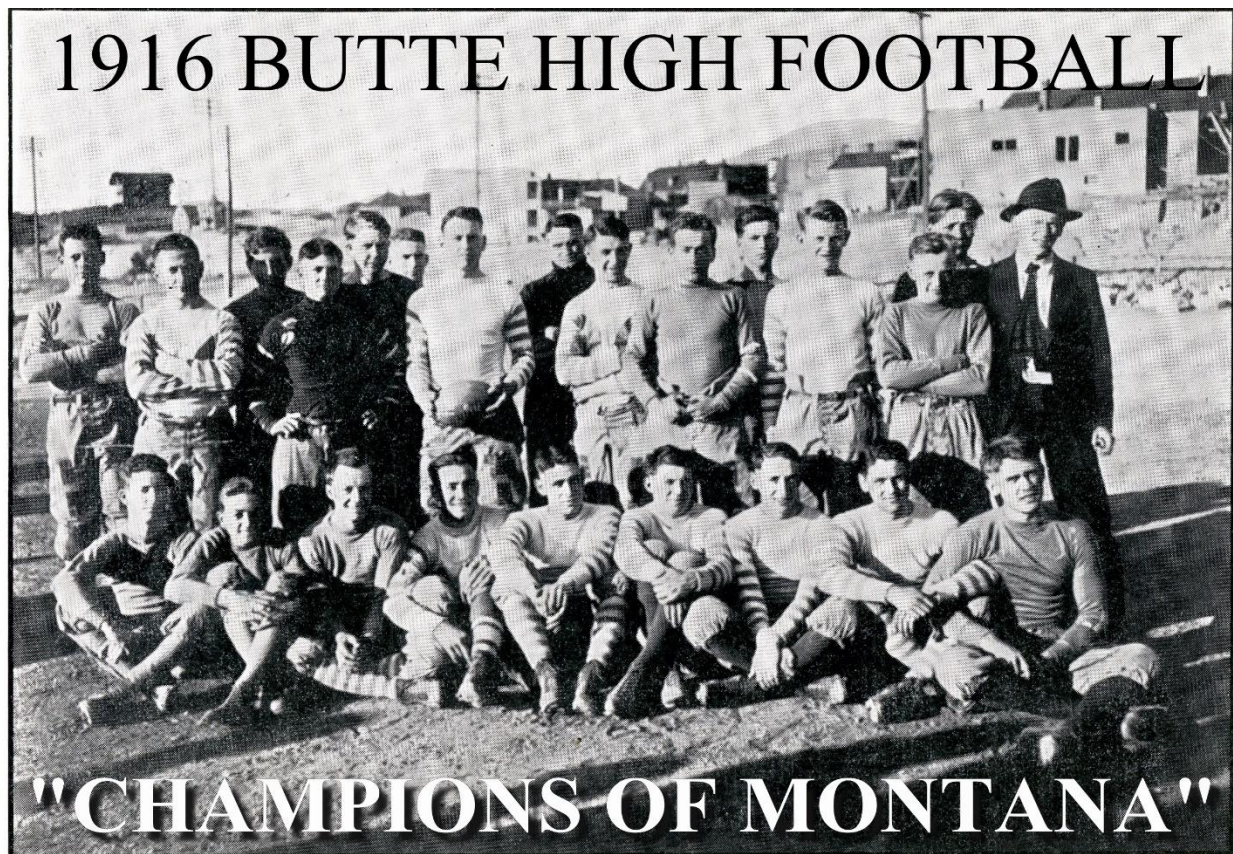

Rejected for Both Voluntary Enlistment and
Draft, He Wins Post With Y. M. C. A.

After futile attempts to "break" into the military service of the United States, by enlistment and through the draft, R. W. Shirey, physical training director at Butte high school, was a happy man today, when he received final notification that he had been accepted for service with the Y. M. C. A. in France. Mr. Shirey will leave Butte March 2, going first to Salt Lake, on a short visit, and then to New York, from where he will sail about March 10 or 12 for "over there."

Because of defective eyesight Mr. Shirey could not make the hurdles when he attempted to enlist in the army. The result of the examination by the draft board was a rejection for the same reason.

However, he was anxious to enter the service in some branch and the news that he was selected to be in charge of athletic work at some Y. M. C. A. station near the battle line was the most welcome and cheering he had received in a long while.

This is Mr. Shirey's first year as mentor of athletics at Butte high. He

has made an enviable record, and Butte, as a result of his coaching, has occupied an important place on the athletic map of Montana. Out of raw material he has built up a strong, smooth and effective basketball machine, which is considered a contender for state honors. In all other forms of physical training he has shown marked teaching ability.

Those who have come in contact with him, in the classroom or without, regret to hear of his leaving, although they are pleased that his ambition will be realized and that he has been appointed to this important post. His pleasing personality and debonair manner have won many friends for him and all wish him well in his new undertaking.

Mr. Shirey is a graduate of the class of 1914, Nebraska university. In 1916 he completed a post graduate course at Columbia. He then went to Salt Lake where he was in charge of athletics at West Side high. Last fall he came to Butte to take a similar position at Butte high school.

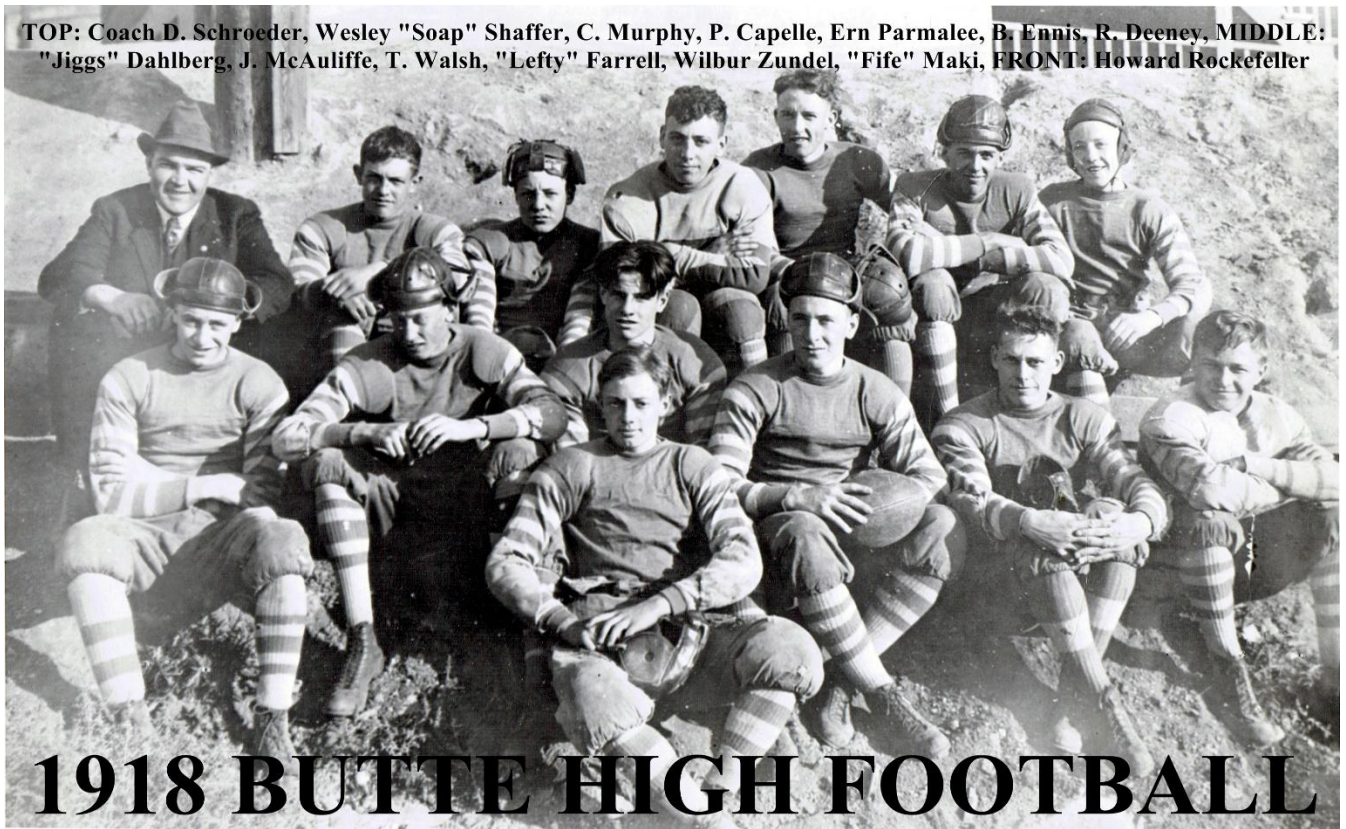

LOCALS OUTPLAY VISITORS DURING FIRST HALF, THEN WEAKEN RAPIDLY

Butte Eleven Works Hard at Opening of Game and Are Held a Few Yards from Goal Line. Opponents Have Walkaway at End of Game. First Half Scoreless.

Great Falls, 26; Butte, 0.

Although Butte played a hard, fast game yesterday, and during the first half kept the ball in the visitors' territory, Great Falls came back with a vengeance in the second half, beating the local team by a decisive score.

With her own goal threatened only once during the entire first half, Butte high kept the ball in their opponents' territory continually and were within striking distance three times, only to lose the ball on downs or through poor generalship. Twice the local players had the ball on Great Falls' two-yard line, but lost the ball both times by trying a forward pass, when a line buck by Boyer or Grady probably would have netted a touchdown. The game was rough throughout, and several substitutions were made in both lineups. During the first half Gonser took the place of Baier at right end for Great Falls and just as the third quarter ended Allen, Great Falls' star right tackle, who two years ago made the all-state team, collapsed in the field. He was carried to the sidelines. Penalties were frequent, especially during the first half, both teams being penalized for holding and for being off-side.

Butte kicked off and Cuddihy returned the ball 13 yards. In three downs Great Falls made three yards and kicked 25 yards, the ball going out of bounds. Boyer carried the ball seven yards around left end, but two line plunges by Boyer and Dunn lost two yards. Great Falls was penalized 15 yards for holding. Grady made three yards on a line buck, but after being penalized for being off-side, Butte lost the ball on downs, three line plunges netting them only six of the required 10 yards.

Great Falls used White for four downs, gaining 26 yards, but lost the ball on downs, when Norris failed to make four yards on two line bucks. Butte took the ball four yards on two line plunges, but was penalized 15 yards for holding. Brennan kicked, and Great Falls took the ball on their own 20-yard line and returned three yards.

Two line bucks netted Great Falls two yards, but they were penalized 15 yards for holding, and resorted to a kick. Chapman caught the ball and returned it three yards. Dunn made two yards, but on the next down Grady fumbled, recovering it for a two-yard loss. Two line bucks by Grady netted 10 yards for Butte, and Boyer added two yards more by an end run. A forward pass, Chapman to Brennan, failed.

Pass Falls.

Butte tried the forward pass again and lost to Great Falls, who resorted to a kick. Boyer made three yards through center and three around left end. Grady made three on a line buck, and with the ball on Great Falls' two-yard line, Chapman tried another forward pass to Brennan. Brennan failed to catch the ball, and it went to Great Falls on their 20-yard line. Norris made a pretty 40-yard run around left end, and the electricians made their downs twice on line bucks, but finally failed to make their yardage.

Butte made 35 yards in five plays, Grady making 15 of them on a line buck. A forward pass, Chapman to Crowley, was intercepted by Gonser, who had taken Baier's place at right end. After a pretty 40-yard run, Gonser was overtaken and downed by Crowley. Great Falls tried a line buck and failed to make their yardage, and after they were penalized 15 yards for holding, the ball again changed hands on a kick. Butte took the ball on their own 20-yard line, and after trying line bucks and end runs lost it on downs. Great Falls then tried the same tactics, lost on yardage.

Butte took the ball and after Chapman had carried it six yards, and Grady 10, Boyer went around left end for a 25-yard gain. For successive downs failed to get them the required yardage, however, and Great Falls again took the ball. When they failed to make the required yards, they at-

Second Half.

Swan took Bourquin's place as umpire. Great Falls kicked to Boyer, who received the ball on Butte's 20 yard line, and returned it 12 yards. After winning 23 yards on end runs and line bucks, the ball went to Great Falls, who started a steady march toward Butte's goal. Allen carrying the ball across for the first touchdown of the game, White kicked goal. Great Falls kicked off and Chapman returned 15 yards. Butte showed a great deal of fight, and carried the ball 31 yards on line bucks, but were forced to kick. Great Falls took the ball on their 30 yard line, and after carrying it for 20 yards on line plays, lost it on yardage. Butte worked down to Great Falls' three-yard line, but lost on downs. Great Falls tried line bucks, but lost the ball on a fumble. Butte recovered on Great Falls' 13 yard line, and after three attempts at line bucks, tried a forward pass, which fell to the ground back of the goal posts. Here Great Falls scrimmaged on their 20 yard line, and their 50-pound quarter back, E. Hodges, went through the line for an eight-yard gain. Great Falls from this line galloped almost at will, making from 6 to 15 yards each down. Peterson took the ball around Butte's right end for 15 yards, but was downed by Boyer. Allen was carried from the field suffering from internal injuries. The quarter ended with the ball on Butte's 34 yard line.

Fourth Quarter.

In nine straight line bucks, in which the Butte line seemed to go to pieces, the visitors went over the line for the second touchdown. Peterson failed to kick goal.

Butte received the ball on the kick-off, but after three attempts, was forced to kick. Great Falls again began a triumphant march down the field, but the Butte boys rallied on their one-yard line and tried to kick. A Great Falls man blocked the attempt, and the score stood 20 to 0 in favor of Great Falls.

On the kick-off Chapman carried the ball back 15 yards. Butte fought hard and made 26 yards in four downs. A forward pass, Chapman to Brennan, was intercepted by Gonser, who raced 60 yards for a touchdown. White failed to kick goal, and the final score stood 26 to 0 in favor of Great Falls.

Great Falls now opened the game wide open and tried several forward passes, none of which were successful. They lost the ball on downs and the game ended with the ball again in Butte's possession on Great Falls' 24-yard line.

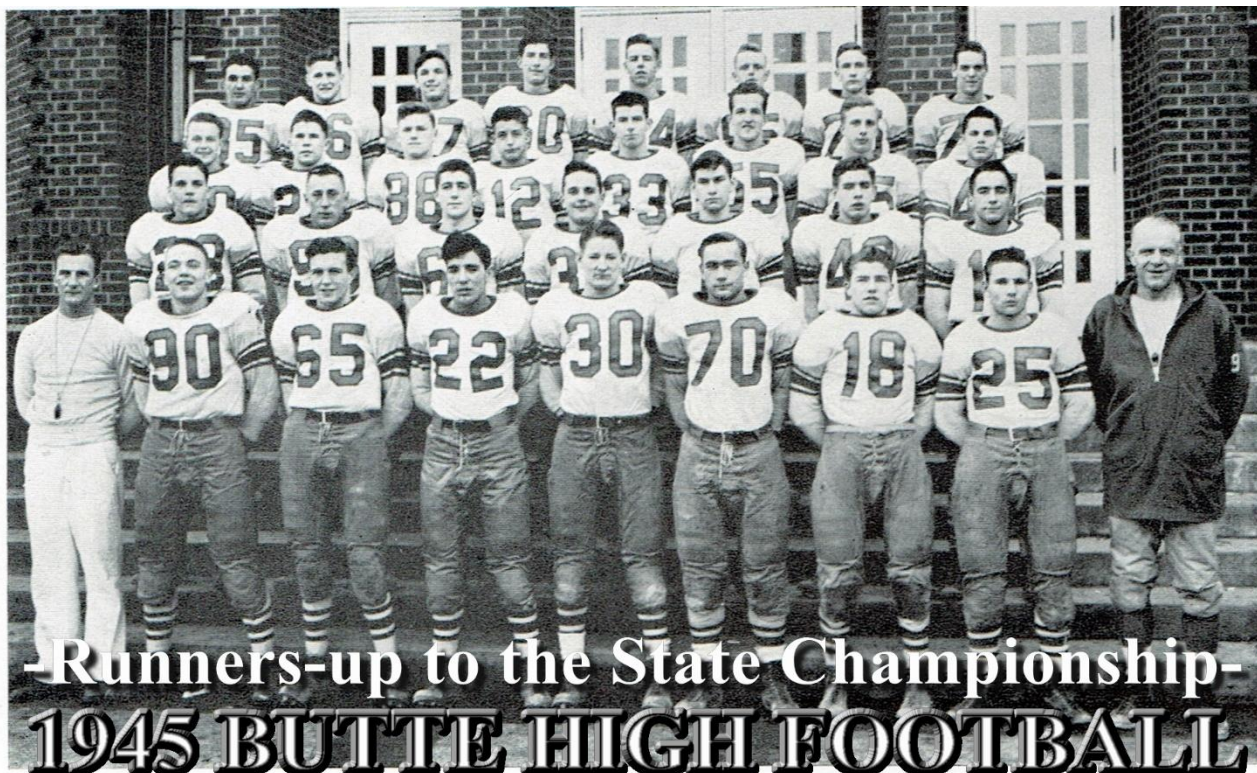


COACH HARRY DAHLBERG

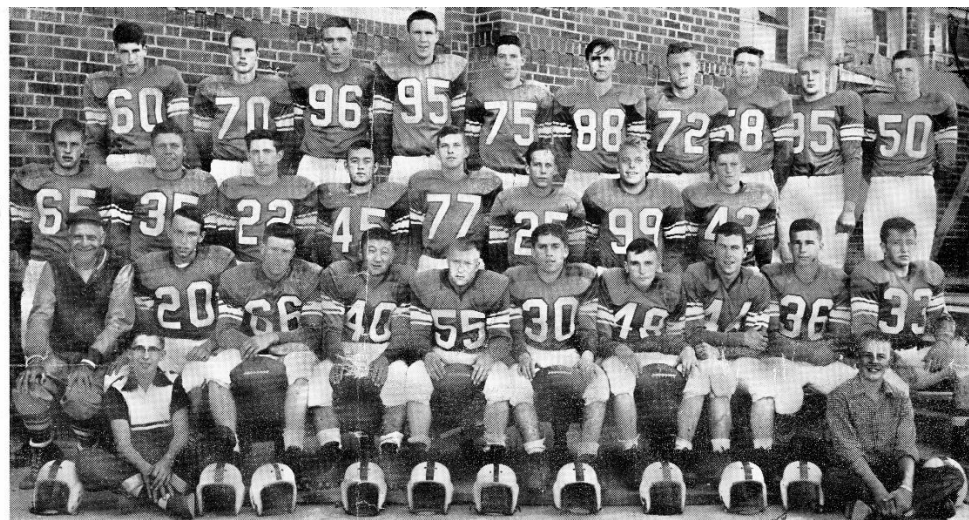
Spartans Are Again Top Team of State
